


1.4 million (13.5%) of North Carolinians have some type of disability.



Employment outcomes


Individuals with disabilities have lower Employment and Labor Force Participation rates


NC Public High School Graduates

Real average annual wage of 2000-2010 NC public high school graduates



Students with Disabilities Are Less Likely to Enroll In or Complete Higher Ed


Higher education enrollment (within 4 years) and completion (within eight years) of 2000-2010 NC public high school graduates




Individuals with Disabilities Go to Prison at a Higher Rate than Their Peers

Cumulative share of individuals exiting public high school in 2000-2010 who entered prison in NC




Dropouts Face Elevated Risk of Prison: Especially Those with Disabilities

Note: The likelihood of individuals with visual impairment/blindness, hearing impairment/deafness, or speech impairment going to prison in NC was not significantly different from their peers without disabilities. Individuals with other health impairments or multiple disabilities are not reported here.
