Major Initiatives

ReCONNECT NC: FY 2019-2020 was the second year for ReCONNECT NC, the focus of most of IEI's Forum and community work. We continue to support 20 community partners working on topics related to ReCONNECT.

BAND-NC: In June 2020, IEI launched this new statewide grant and training program designed to increase broadband adoption in homes across NC for education, work, and health from home.

Major Programs

Rural Faith Communities as Anchor

Institutions: IEI continued its work with rural churches and pastors to increase both their capacity and interest in helping to address significant community challenges across NC. 110 pastors, lay leaders and others came together for discussions and mutual support post-COVID-19.

Service Year NC: IEI was the first organization selected by the national Service Year Alliance for statewide work to increase the number of people performing "service years." The program continued to grow in 2019-2020.

KidsReadyNC: IEI concluded its two-year, lower-cost model of providing technical assistance for county-based early childhood efforts in Tier 1 and 2 communities.

Internal work continues: IEI held diversity discussions during its organizational retreat, in addition to conducting a "Tree of Life" and "10 Lenses" exercise with staff.

Work on Diversity, Equity and Inclusion expands: In FY 2020-2021, IEI will continue this work through modules offered by OIED, hiring a consultant to assist us in increasing our knowledge of diversity, equity, and inclusion; and integrating a lens on equity and inclusion into our external programming work.
